What does this Fund invest in?

The Fund invests primarily in equity securities issued by a broad range of U.S. companies. Investments will generally be denominated in U.S. dollars. The Fund uses a systematic investment approach by which the Fund invests in companies according to their economic scale. A company's contribution to gross national product (GNP), which is the difference between a company's outputs and inputs, is the chosen measure of economic scale.

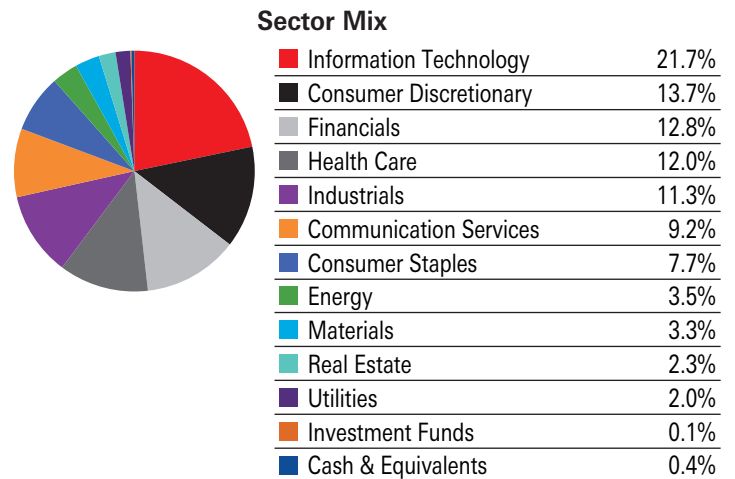
On or around April 16, 2021, the Fund will invest primarily in equity securities issued by mid-cap and large-cap growth and value U.S. companies. Investments will generally be denominated in U.S. dollars. The Fund will use fundamental analysis and both top-down and bottom-up approaches to select securities and allocate sector weightings.

The charts below give you a snapshot of the Fund's investments on January 31, 2021. The Fund's investments will change.

How risky is it?

The value of the Fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much the Fund’s returns change over time. This is called “volatility”.

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

HSBC Global Asset Management (Canada) Limited has rated the volatility of this Fund as **medium**.

This rating is based on how much the Fund’s returns have changed from year to year. It doesn’t tell you how volatile the Fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

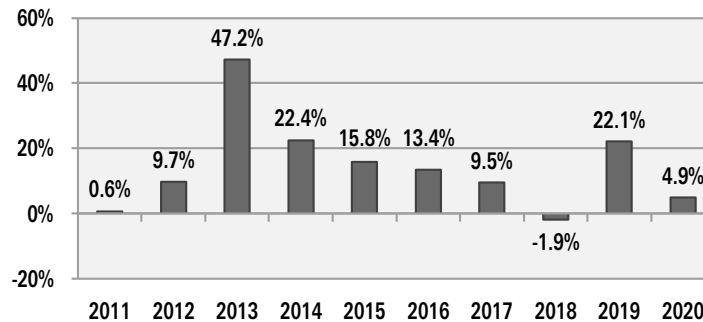
Like most mutual funds, this Fund doesn’t have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

How has the Fund performed?

This section tells you how the units of the Fund have performed over the past 10 years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the Fund’s returns.

Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how the units of the Fund performed in each of the past 10 calendar years. The Fund dropped in value in 1 of the 10 years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the Fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the Fund will perform in the future.



Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for the units of the Fund in a 3-month period over the past 10 years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

Average return

A person who invested \$1,000 in the units of the Fund 10 years ago would have \$3,519.52 on January 31, 2021. This works out to an annual compound return of 13.41% a year.

Who is this Fund for?

This Fund might be suitable for investors who:

- want to earn long-term capital growth
- have a long-term investment time horizon

- have a medium tolerance for risk

! It is not suitable for investors with a low or low to medium tolerance for risk or a short- or medium-term investment time horizon.

A word about tax

In general, you pay tax on your share of the Fund's taxable earnings and capital gains you realize from redeeming your investment. The amount of tax depends on the tax rates that apply to you, and the type of earnings realized by the Fund (e.g. interest, dividends, capital gains, etc.) and whether or not you hold your investment within a registered retirement savings plan or other registered plan.

Keep in mind that if you hold your investment outside of a registered plan, you will receive a tax slip that shows your share of the Fund's earnings. You must report your share of the taxable earnings in your taxable income, whether you receive them in cash or have them reinvested. In addition, you must calculate your taxable capital gains realized on redemption.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell units of the Fund. The fees and expenses — including any commissions — can vary among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Sales charges

No sales charges apply when you purchase or redeem units of the Fund.

2. Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the Fund's return.

As of June 30, 2020, the Fund's expenses were 0.07% of its value. This equals \$0.70 for every \$1,000 invested.

3. More about the trailing commission

HSBC Global Asset Management (Canada) Limited does not pay your representative a trailing commission for the units you own of the Fund.

4. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch units of the Fund.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund units within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory. For more information, see the securities law of your province or territory or ask a lawyer.
